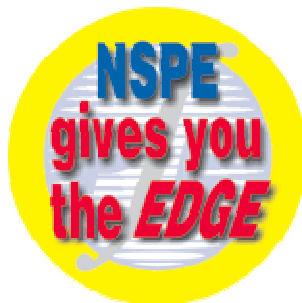

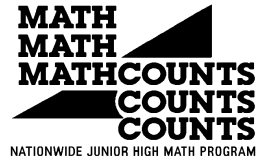

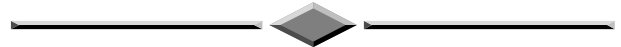
Chapter 4 has a large enough group that we are able to donate and support several groups and functions including:

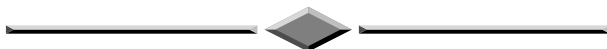
## Chapter 1 News – Grand Forks – (continued from p. 3)

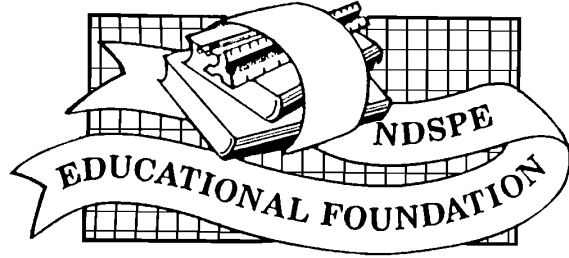

**Foundation Information**

The North Dakota Society of Professional Engineers started the Educational Foundation with a generous contribution of \$10,000. Today, the Foundation’s assets exceed \$30,000. The first scholarships given by the Foundation were in 1986 and amounted to \$400. We are now providing \$1,200 each year in scholarships.

The Foundation provides scholarships with the investment return income from donations received from individuals, societies and companies. Two classifications of money comprise the Foundation’s assets. They are “restricted funds” and “unrestricted funds.” Contributions and gifts to the Foundation become “restricted funds,” meaning they cannot be spent or disbursed. Return on investment becomes “unrestricted funds,” which can be spent on operating costs or

disbursed as scholarships.

In order to disburse more money as scholarships, especially when investment return rates are near historic lows, we must increase our investment assets. The primary method of accomplishing this is to encourage NDSPE members and other engineers and engineering companies to contribute more to the Foundation. Please consider making a contribution to the NDSPE Educational Foundation.

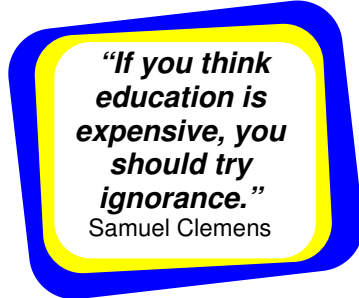

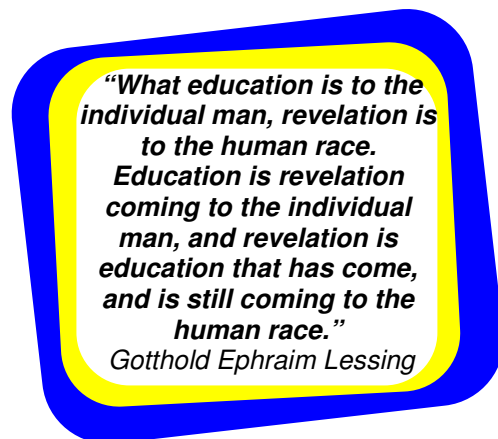

# News from the State Board of Registration

### Results From October FE Examination

Scores from the October 26, 2002, FE Examination were received. The overall results were very good. One hundred, fifty-eight individuals took the examination in Bismarck, Fargo and Grand Forks. Of those, one hundred, thirty-seven (137) received a passing grade of 70 or more on the examination for a pass percentage of 86.7% which is without doubt, one of the best pass rates in the nation.

### Registrations over the Past Year

One hundred seventy individuals were registered as professional engineers thus far in 2002. The amount includes thirty-five North Dakota individuals who passed the PE Examination and were registered. The balance of the new PE registrants was engineer endorsements from other states. We are waiting for the October, 2002 PE examination results.

### Examination Schedule Released For 2003

The PE Examination will be given on April 11, 2003 and on October 24, 2003 at Bismarck State College. The FE Examination will be given on April 12, 2003 and October 24, 2003 at Bismarck State College and at NDSU and UND. Both the PE and FE are eight-hour examinations. The PE Examination is an "open book" exam while the FE exam is a "closed book" examination. Deadlines for the examinations are January 2nd for the spring examination and July 1st for the fall examinations respectively. The only PE examinations given during the spring session are in the following disciplines - Chemical, Civil, Electrical, Environmental, Mechanical and Structural I and Structural II All PE discipline examinations are administered during the fall session.

### State Board Announces Proposed Legislative Changes

The State Board of Registration will be seeking legislative changes in several areas of the engineer and surveying registration laws. The Board's Legal & Investigations Committee was given the task by the State Board to describe and isolate the proposed issues, develop position papers on the proposed issues, get the legislation drafted and secure sponsors for the proposed legislation. A committee composed of representatives from some of the major societies and groups within the state such as NDSPE, NDSLPS and NDCEC, in addition to the State Board, is working on the legislative program. Committee members appeared before groups like the NDSPE and its local chapters and requested letters of support and endorsement. Letters of support and resolutions have been received from NDSPE and its local chapters as well as NDSLPS and its local chapters and from NDCEC. Letters of support are expected from some state officials and state agencies.

The Committee isolated five issues and upon the advice of some veteran lawmakers, divided the issues into two proposed bills, one that deals with registration changes and classifications and continuing education and one that deals with financial considerations.

One bill establishes a new engineer registration category and deletes another. A new registration category is being proposed which would set out registration requirements for individuals who possess an engineering related baccalaureate degree. Under this category, the individual would need six years of engineering experience to be approved to take the FE Examination and a total of twelve years of engineering experience to be approved to take the PE Examination. At present, this same person needs twenty years of experience to be approved to take both examinations. The second part of the bill would delete the registration method whereby someone who does not have an engineering or engineering-related baccalaureate degree can become registered as a PE. The proposed bill would not affect individuals already have obtained their FIT certificate or

those who will obtain, their EIT certificate by July 1, 2004. This bill also provides for a "retired" status for engineers and surveyors. Under the "retired" status, the individual will be able to continue to call himself or herself a professional engineer or surveyor but he or she will not be able to practice professionally. The "retired" fee would be less than the current biennial fee of \$100.00 for engineers and surveyors. A "retired" registrant could revert to active status by making payment of the regular renewal fee and complying with continuing education requirements (if enacted by the Legislature). The third and remaining part of the proposed bill is enactment of a continuing education requirement for engineers and surveyors. The proposed legislation would give the State Board the power to develop and implement a plan. The text of the plan would not be written into the law but would be developed by the State Board through the public hearing process.

The second bill being proposed by the State Board deals with fee caps for engineer /surveyor renewals and with the State Board's ability to recover legal & investigation costs incurred in a disciplinary matter. At the present time, the biennial renewal fee for 2003/2004 for engineers and surveyors is \$100. This is the maximum biennial renewal fee that can be charged under existing law. This \$100.00 maximum fee cap has been part of the engineering/surveying law for nearly forty years and the State Board has used restraint in reaching the present renewal fee level. Under the proposed legislation, the State Board will be requesting that the biennial fee cap for engineers and surveyors be increased to \$200 or \$100 annually. This would allow the State Board to establish renewal fees consistent with its financial needs and resources and within the fee cap limitations, and to do so without having to go back to the legislature each time an increase becomes necessary. The increase in renewal fees should be adequate for the next twenty-five years or longer if past history is any guide. The other part of the proposed bill would allow the State Board to recover the investigation, legal and hearing costs it incurs in disciplinary matters where a registrant is found guilty. At the present time, the State Board pays for all of the costs of investigating and prosecuting a complaint against a registrant whether or not that registrant is found guilty of the charges. Under the proposed legislation the State Board could direct a registrant found guilty in a disciplinary matter brought by the State Board to pay to the State Board a sum to not exceed the Board's

reasonable and actual costs incurred relative to the disciplinary matter.

Both proposed bills will be introduced in the State House of Representatives and will be initially heard in the House Industry, Business and Labor Committee where the bills' main sponsors and supporters are members.

### **How Can You Help?**

If you agree with what the State Board is trying to do, you can help the State Board in two areas. The first is to become acquainted with the two proposed pieces of legislation. The text of the proposed legislation and position papers on all five issues can be obtained from the State Board Office. Secondly, you are urged to contact your legislators to tell them why you feel they should support these pieces of proposed legislation. You can contact them by e-mail, by letter, by telephone or in direct communication with them. Your request of support can make all the difference especially if you are talking to your own representative or senator. We need registrants from around the state to help the State Board and the Committee in this regard. All new laws will be promulgated into rules and regulations through the Administrative Rules Hearing process. These hearings will be scheduled for the fall of 2003 at which time the State Board will be soliciting your thoughts and recommendations on how to implement all of the new laws that have been enacted. The hearing process will only be as good as the public input that it is able to get from registrants like yourself. The State Board would like to count on you in both of these areas.
