A Note from the President



As I write this message, I must admit I am feeling a little bit apprehensive. Eight months of my 12-month term are complete and yet I feel there is much work left to be done. In the last year we have seen the reorganization of NSPE at both the national level and at the regional level. We have elected two new regional Vice-Presidents and are in the process of eliminating our National Director's position. We are in the beginning stages of a national recruitment effort, which will culminate in a visit to North Dakota by NSPE's membership consultant, and the development of a state specific membership plan. Committees have been filled and specific tasks assigned and yet there is much work left to be done.

NDSPE has been following all legislative activities that have a direct or indirect impact on our profession. Ron Rebenitsch, who chairs our legislative committee, has done a superb job in keeping the Board of Directors, and legislative committee apprised of all significant legislation. I must admit that I was personally disappointed with the defeat of Senate Bill 2186, which pertained to continuing education. As most of you know, NDSPE, through its Board of Directors and the four chapters adopted resolutions supporting this effort. In NSPE's preamble to its by-laws, it is stated that the National Society "*shall undertake programs to advance engineering education to the end that engineering competence will be developed within a frame work of culture, integrity, and dedication to the public good.*" NSPE shall also "*undertake to advance self-education and self-improvement motivating the practicing engineer to upgrade and expand his or her competency by continuing study during his or her entire career.*" In my opinion, continuing education is a tool to achieve this goal. I am confident this issue will be brought before the legislature in 2003 and I fully expect NDSPE to present a more vocal and united front at that time.

As you may know, planning for our annual meeting is underway with the tentative agenda printed in this issue of our newsletter. I look forward to the joint sessions we will have with the North Dakota Consulting Engineers Council. I want to thank Chapter I for their efforts in putting this meeting together. All chapters should be submitting their Young Engineer candidates to the awards committee for their review. Remember to submit projects for recognition at the same time and keep in mind the Chandler Award may be awarded if a worthy candidate is sponsored. I hope your schedule will allow you to attend.

I will keep this message brief. My President's message to the Society will be presented at the annual meeting in Grand Forks. Until then, I wish you well and want to thank you for allowing me to serve as your President. I ask for your continued support for the remainder of my term and remember, there is much work left to be done. Chapter 01 President

We began the year with officer elections at our October meeting. The newly elected officers were Tim Hendricks, EIT - President; Scott Zainhofsky, EIT - Vice President; Boyd Johnson - Secretary-Treasurer. Unfortunately for NDSPE, Tim Hendricks accepted a new position with the US Forest Service in Colorado, in January 2001. We determined that the Vice-President should move up to President and leave the Vice-President open. Therefore, our officers now consist of Scott Zainhofsky (President) and Boyd Johnson (Sec.-Treasurer).

The first two meetings under the new officers (October and November) consisted of organizing committees to prepare a member survey and Chapter by-laws (as the previous ones were lost - presumably in the flood of 1997). The impetus for the survey was that our meeting attendance has fallen in the last couple of years. Until the January meeting we were averaging about seven or eight people per meeting. Based on the responses from the survey, the new officers discovered that continuing education eligible presentations (for those members registered in Minnesota) was a very high priority. Therefore, we have begun an intensive effort to have continuing ed. presentations. Our January meeting featured Mr. Greg Gust of the National Weather Service speaking about the new flood forecasting methodology in the Red River Basin. With the prospect of this very interesting talk our attendance jumped to about 15 members and several professionals interested in becoming members. Our February meeting featured Mr. Leo Fettig of Dakota Ready-Mix, speaking about precast concrete foundations/wall systems. We hope to have many more of this type of speaker in the future.

Licensed Member – A Licensed Member shall be defined as a person holding a valid license or certificate of registration as a professional engineer, issued under the laws of any state, territory, possession, or district of the United States, or a province or territory of Canada; or the equivalent under the laws of any country.”*
- “a.2. Licensed Life Member – A Licensed Life Member shall be defined as a person who has held a valid license or a certificate of registration as a professional engineer, issued under the laws of any state, territory, possession, or district of the*

United States, or a province or a territory of Canada, or the equivalent, under the laws of any country; and whose status had been changed to Life Member status, and who obtained and retained a valid license or certification of registration, while in active practice as a professional engineer, until retirement. A Life Member shall not pay any State Society dues. Each Life Member shall be given an option in writing to contribute to NSPE annually.”

“The requirements for Licensed Life Member status are as follows:”

“a.2.1 Shall have retired from the active practice of professional engineering; and

a.2.2 Shall be at least 60 years of age; and

a.2.3 Shall have been a Member of the Society, above student grade, in good standing for a continuous period of at least 40 years. Application for status as a Licensed Life Member may be made personally, by the Member’s Chapter, or by the State Society.

a.2.4 A majority of the Board of Directors approval of the application is required.”

“a.3. Licensed Retired Member – A Licensed Retired Member must have been eligible for Retired Member status prior to August 1, 1995. Licensed Retired Members shall pay one-half Licensed Member dues of the State Society. The application for Licensed Retired Member status can be made personally, by the Member’s Chapter, or by the State Society.”

“The requirements for Licensed Retired Member status are as follows:”

“a.3.1. A Licensed Retired Member shall be defined as a person who has held a valid license or a certificate of registration as a professional engineer, issued under the laws of any state, territory, possession, or district of the United States, or a province or territory of Canada, or the equivalent under the laws of any country; and whose status had been changed to Licensed Retired Member status, and who obtained and retained a valid license or certificate of registration, while in active practice as a professional engineer, until retirement.”

“a.3.2 Shall be retired from full-time employment as a professional engineer and engaged in less than 20 hours of professional engineering per week and shall be at least 60 years of age.”

“b.1. Member – A Member shall be defined as a person of high moral character who is:”

“b.2. A certified engineer-in-training (Engineering Intern), or the equivalent under the laws of the United States, Canada, or other country, or”

“b.3. A graduate engineer who has graduated from an engineering curriculum accredited by the Accreditation Board for Engineering and Technology (ABET); or has graduated from an engineering curriculum which is accredited by ABET within six year after graduation; or has a graduate engineering degree from a college or university which has one or more undergraduate engineering curricula accredited by ABET. For a graduate of an engineering curriculum in a foreign

country, the applicant shall possess educational background equivalent to that attained from an engineering curriculum accredited by ABET.”

“b.4. A Member shall advance to the Licensed Member status as soon as eligible by licensing or registration.”

“c.1. Honorary Member – An individual, whose knowledge and accomplishments deserve special recognition for that individuals outstanding contributions to the engineering profession and or the public good. An Honorary Member shall not have voting privileges, may not hold office, and shall pay no dues. An honorary membership shall only be awarded upon the approval of two-thirds of the NDSPE Board of Directors.”

“d.1. Student Member – A Student Member is a person who is enrolled in an ABET accredited engineering program or an engineering or pre-engineering program that leads to engineering licensure, and is carrying at least 12 credit hours. A full-time graduate student in engineering may chose any grade of membership, for which eligible, including Student Member.”

“d.2. A Student Member does not have voting privileges and may not hold any State Society office.”



This has been another busy year for the F-M Engineers Club. The Club's membership increased to 96 members, up from 88 last year. In September, the new officers took their positions. This spring, we are looking forward to the third annual golf outing that will be held in May and the family picnic that will conclude our meetings for the year. The F-M Engineers extends its appreciation to all the firms and individuals who have helped make this another successful year.

NSPE WINTER MEETING ANCHORAGE, ALASKA

Recently I attended the NSPE Winter meeting on February 1-5, 2001 in Anchorage Alaska. The meeting was very informative and well presented and they even provided us with a snowstorm on the first day. The last National NSPE meeting I attended was in 1995. NSPE through its restructuring and down sizing program has reduced its governance board from over 100 to the mid 20's and it appears to operate more efficiently and effectively. There were many good leadership sessions and programs that I attended and the following is a brief overview. A more detailed report will be provided at our April 5-6 annual meeting.

1. Leadership Training - Annette Petrick, NSPE Consultant, provided a interactive workshop session on leadership and the methods used by effective leaders.
2. Pat Natale, NSPE Staff, provided an overview of all NSPE products and services. I picked up several copies of a pamphlet entitle Professional Resources for Engineers, 2001 which is available from NSPE and outlines most of their product and services. I will provide a copy to each chapter president if anyone is interested.
3. American Engineering Campaign - In the 2000 summer meeting, NSPE adopted at three-year plan to increase the understanding and appreciation of the role of the Engineer in improving the quality of life. Each state will be asked to play an active role by providing a state coordinator and will be provided with resources and data. The campaign is funded for one year and NSPE is actively looking at funding partners for year two and three and is also considering a one time dues increase of \$15-\$25 per year for two years.
4. NSPE Road Show - Annette Petrick has prepared a detailed membership initiative plan which will be provided to all state societies. Annette will meet with all 50 states to create a customized membership marketing plan tailored to our states needs. This appears to be an excellent opportunity for NDSPE to design and set up our own membership recruitment plan and to revitalize our membership.
5. NSPE Strategic Plan - At the Sunday membership Consensus Congress the proposed strategic plan was thoroughly discussed, slightly modified and overwhelming recommended to the NSPE Board for approval. Each state is requested to prepare a state strategic plan with about 1/3 of the states already done. I have several examples from other states and will discuss this further with the NDSPE Board.
6. Regional Meetings - Each regional met separately to discuss national and state engineering issues. The North Central Region is made up of seven states (North Dakota, Minnesota, South Dakota, Iowa, Nebraska, Kansas and Missouri), has two VP's (Don Edwards and Art Dewitt) who serve on the NSPE Board and one rep from each of the five practice division. One item of interest is the annual \$10,000 Steiman award for college engineering students. This will be awarded to an engineering student in the North Central Region and there are no current applications. Any one interested please contact me on go to the NSPE Web Page. The next North Central Region meeting is in DesMoines Iowa on September 6 and 7 and is open to all NSPE members.
7. The NSPE Surnmer meeting will be held in Detroit, Michigan on July 26-31, 2001. North Dakota needs to provide one person to serve on the nominating committee. If you are interested or know of anyone interested please contact Steve or me.

Attending the NSPE winter meeting was informative and fun. Not only do you learn a lot, it provides an excellent chance for networking with other Engineers and see what other states are doing.
